
The metro area Master Gardener program is growing

In 2019, we trained 185 students, which is 40% more than just two years ago.

2019 program highlights

A cohort of 14 students with the US Veterens' Affairs took the training in 2019

In addition to receiving Certificates of Home Horticulture, VA Farm participants took part in MG volunteer activities. We tabled at several VA events, with MGs and military veterans working side by side.

The VA Farm participants also took part in OSU Small Farms classes as part of their program to train new farmers. We expect another cohort from the VA in 2020.



Speakers' Guild, 10-Minute University, and Oregon Food Bank seminars

A group of dedicated MG volunteers made 172 presentations to the community on gardening topics.

Over 6,550 people attended seminars led by MG volunteers at public events and demonstrations gardens and for community groups by request.

Thirty two MG volunteers contributed over 1,000 hours toward Oregon Food Bank's Dig In! and Seed to Supper class series.

Focus on phone helplines


Master Gardeners served 4,965 clients at the Clackamas, Multnomah, and Washington locations
