Adeline Oka

This is a photo of Adeline and her good friend Bill, taken on the streets of downtown Corvallis. Bill is homeless and hitchhiked from the Florida Keys to Oregon to fulfill a lifelong dream: watching a live Beavers football game. Bill had a traumatic childhood in Pennsylvania. The one bright light during that dark period was seeing his name on TV. It was during the broadcast of a college football game. (Bill's last name is Beaver). This photo tells you a few things about Adeline:



 She is friends with beavers and humans of all stripes. (She wants to be your friend too!) (Especially if you farm animals.) (Or a sauna.) (Or can prepare authentic Turkish food—she lived in Istanbul for a couple years and has been jonesing for some hunkar begendi and manti.)

- 3. Like Bill, she came here from Florida—Miami Beach, specifically. There she worked for the OAS (Organization of American States); co-founded a business magazine/media company (and through that hobnobbed with the Who's Who in South Florida's business, political, and entertainment scenes); as well as launched a debate program and taught writing courses in state prisons.
- 4. Like Bill, she got here via land. (17-day road trip. WITH HER MOTHER). Her passion for overland travel extends beyond cars: she loves long-distance train rides and rail infrastructure broadly. Once, she bought a 30-day Amtrak rail pass and circumnavigated the continental US.
- 5. Like Bill, she is a transient: in addition to the aforementioned sites, she has also lived and worked in the San Fernando Valley (her childhood home and also the "Porn Capital of the World); western Massachusetts; Madrid, Spain (where she was a Fulbright grantee); the South Bronx (where she first gained experience in human subject research); the medieval hamlet of Cambridge, England (where she completed her master's in international development); and multiple cities in Indonesia.



6. Like Bill, she came to Corvallis in pursuit of beavers. In 2017, she read a gripping essay in the Paris Review about a famous skydiving beaver: in the 1940s, Geronimo was strapped onto a parachute and launched from a warplane as the test candidate (pilot, one might say. See #1 above, re: beaver puns) for an initiative by Idaho Fish and Wildlife to both relocate beavers into the deep woods, away from more peopled areas, whilst making use of a surplus for planes and parachutes leftover from World War II. (Seventy-six beavers were subsequently relocated this way). Months after the publication of this article, its



author, Elena Passarello—whom the New York Times called a "master" of the essay form—became Adeline's academic advisor when she matriculated to OSU's MFA in Creative Writing program as a Provost's Fellow.

The thing about beavers is they are compulsive home builders. Adeline is taking a page from them and making a home for herself here, thereby putting to rest—for now—her wandering ways. Go Beavs!
