The garden is winding down, but some tomatoes, squash and beans are still going and there are beds with fall plants, radishes of different sizes, turnips, beets, carrots, broccoli, cabbages and more. Some gardeners have cleaned up their beds already. The rain has been a welcome relief and allowed us to do more clean up in the demo areas instead of just trying to keep things watered. We have appreciated

the few who have helped volunteer this season. We harvested 291 pounds of produce this last month for the Food Bank; cucumbers, kale, collards, onions, potatoes, beans, tomatoes, lettuce, zucchini and cabbages.

All gardeners have until Dec 1 to garden and then there will be a work party on December 2 to close the garden up for the season, it has been an excellent garden year. Applications for 2024 will be available Jan 3, 2024 on a first come, first serve basis. We are measuring beds right now to order lumber to redo the lower boxes where boards have been rotting, and will plan a couple of work parties starting in January for anyone interested in helping. October Garden report for Harvest Moon Garden in Coquille

Well fall is upon us. Most of the tomatoes are finishing up or are gone. Squash plants are gasping their last efforts.

Some Gardeners are closing down their beds for the year and we will plant a cool weather cover crop on as many as we can. I have 5 lbs. specifically for this but I have never done this so I don't know how far the seeds will go.

Some of us have put in fall crops. We have cabbage, spinach, swill chard, kale, lettuce, arugula, radishes and we put in green beans. They were put in places where we had peas, carrots and beets. We have gotten our first batch of beans to take to the food bank. Speaking of the food bank we have now donated 195 lbs. to the food bank. With more to come.

We are working up the cost to recreate three garden beds on the side by the church in hopes of getting a grant to help pay for it. We plan to use cement blocks to make the walls. They would be 16" high this year with hope to raise the walls another eight inches next year. We have had an increased interest in renting the beds this year. Especially after the Garden Tour put on by the Coquille Garden Club. I am in the process of building a seed box that will be thermally protective. The shed is actually too hot for the best storage for them. We have felt that the heat has shortened the sprouting life in them. Keep gardening.
