We did have a run of flea beetles, but the plants won that battle, luckily the insects are short lived, just causing minor little holes in leaves of tomatoes, potatoes, arugula, eggplants and more. So far, we have donated 41 pounds of lettuce to the Food Bank from the demo beds, which are all planted for now. Beans, both pole and bush, lettuce, cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage, potatoes, onions, shallots, summer squash, tomatoes, pepper and eggplant and cucumbers. We are trying some climbing zucchini that is sold from Renee's Garden Seeds, that a gardener grew last year, and they did very well. There are sweet peas & amp; annual flowers for gardeners to pick to take home small bouquets.

Cindy, a gardener and a couple gardener/teachers from Blossom Gulch came for an hour one day to learn about worm compost. The kids had a fabulous time.

And I have ordered two signs to replace the worn out/damaged signs that mention to the non-members about picking produce that does not belong to them. Should have them by Thursday.

Sale Committee | 2024 Tomato-Rama

WE made about \$1000 more than last year. It was a successful sale and we look forward to expanding on our selections of plants to include a more diverse selection of vegetables (too many tomatoes) With that said, we are here for the community, and we are deliberately keeping it the size, so that we address the needs of the community.

We are supposed to have the room remodeled by end of June 2024. This will give us a little more room. Barbara requested that we plant different plants-dahlias by seed, house plants, berries, etc. Soil is available now for those of you that want to start earlier cuttings and long growing plants. We also have the 3 ¾ inch pots (only a few right now) and 4 packs for your use available. We will be purchasing 10 by 20s as we get closer to next year, along with 10 cases of the 3 ¾ inch square cell pots. About 4,500 of these. We have 48 bags of Rexius product so that should put us ahead for next year. WE would request that you send what you would like to plant to Tina Powers or Samantha Clayborn as she will be handling the spread sheet, so we have an idea what is being grown. The information is on

the blog, so check it out. Way less tomatoes and more other plants please. Try to be specific what you plan on growing, type, variety, etc. example pink hydrangea 12 plants. Prices will be going up. \$3.00 for veg/tomatoes, 4 and 5 for house plants, multiple cell plants, etc.

WE are requesting that you not only plant tomatoes, but for 2025 to branch out into other vegetables, greens such as lettuces, kale, cabbage be started in the 4 packs, and cuttings in the ½ gal. or 1 gal. round pots. We would like a selection of house plants from those that grow these and would like to see them presented as there was a request for these. Some favorites, dahlias propagated with seed, African Violets, Aloe vera, cacti, perennial flowers that bloom in the spring and summer such as echinacea, annuals such as calendula, Oregon natives such as checker mallow and Oregon grape. Berries went fast so cuttings of these are popular. Remember, nothing dug up will be acceptable due to the possibility of pest contaminated soil so use the bagged soil provide. Check the invasive list to make sure we don't plant an invasive type of plant.

Remember, whatever you take, put your name on the sign-out sheet in the basement next to the soil bags.

There will be a mini class within the veg class or at a meeting for new trainees. Time will be set aside for all new students.

School Garden Grants Committee: Schools received scholarships this year. Powers school district received \$959.92, Myrtle Crest got \$1360.17 and Maple School got \$820. went over 147.41. Robbie got the "send a friend" Scholarship as well.

Coos County Fair: All is good to go. July 23rd through the 27th 2024. Samantha will be out of the office all of August. Passes to get in. Free parking up hill. 4 H scholarship for the fair. Voted on and unanimous.

Coos Bay Farmers Market: Same spot as last year. Going well. Full swing, Booth set up is smooth after a rocky start due to chamber folks did not unlock the door. Got set up and it was windy but worked well. Thank you to Mike Mueller for the set up. We need newcomers' packets. Mike gave out the last of the tomatoes. It was noticed that there were a couple of folks selling plants and perhaps need to let the Market manager knows that they need a temporary nursery license so that invasive plants or contaminated plants are not sold.

We might get a key to open the chamber office to get our equipment out.

Bandon Farmers Market: Started this Friday. Samantha will be there to help set up the booth. We will see how it goes this year. We will be outside.

Oregon Master Gardeners Association No meeting so far, so meeting is next Friday and Will report back next meeting. Hit or miss from OSU. They are revisiting seed to supper and revising it. 19 are involved in it. Looking for ways to get into the communities. Talk does not transfer into action so far. University is not doing anything at this point. They were involved before. OSU is in charge, but not seen. Seed to supper was supposed to be for the blue-collar communities. The MG's were taking the program. Should be serving the community, but so far not doing what was envisioned. Food banks gave up the seed to supper program. They dropped the program. Some people want to participate. We shall see. OSU decided that they have a new volunteer system, to background on Every volunteer. Sam mentioned that if you hear this, come to her. Sam will let us know what's what is. Pilot programs being discussed. We have to do a background check for when we go to school. The rest is in discussion. Nothing definitive at this time. Growing and Belonging Task force is going nowhere either. WE should be reaching out but so far no direction. Coos County 's logo is not on the OMGA website, so we should put ours up there.

The volunteer website will be encompassing every thing volunteer. MG, MFP etc, will all be in this program. Changes are coming but not in play as yet. OMGA newletter is out on line.

Josephine Extension has been de-funded. Commissioners decided to defund them, all of the programs-Grants Pass. Due to 4 H becoming "Woke" OSU "woke". OSU is in talks with them so we shall see. Its sad as they have had a lot of positive things-green house, gardens. Etc.
