Lady Bug Landing (Coos Bay) Garden Report

Lady Bug Landing is starting to take off, most of the plots have been worked and planted with something. We have had pea leaf weevils this year which chew around the edges of seedlings, a little diatomaceous earth has helped with this, also we are starting to see flea beetles on potatoes and some tomatoes, which usually show up after a wet winter and dry spring, but fortunately they are short lived too and most plants recover. The demo beds have been planted so far with; beautiful mixed lettuce, seed shallots, onions, leeks, potatoes, cauliflower, broccoli, and cabbage. We will be planting tomatoes and a few peppers this week. There is a new strawberry bed, and sweet peas and an annual flower bed for gardeners to be able to cut bouquets to take home. We will take the first heads of lettuce this week to the Food Bank and so the season begins. There is a great group of gardeners once again. In July and August, The Beet are going to provide classes at the garden. We got some much-needed rain last night, so we do get a couple days break from hand watering. We want to thank the Master Gardeners for donating left-over plants from the Tomato-Rama plant sale. So appreciated by the gardeners. Happy Gardening

Coquille Community Garden:

They are still working the 2 end beds. Then they will work on the front of the garden. There will be a work party at the end of the month. Half of the gravel has been put in. All beds are full. There will be a Plant Sale and the community building in Coquille on Saturday 5-17 from 9 to 3.

Harmony Gardens (Lakeside):

Most of the beds have been planted. There have been complaints about slugs and snails. Mike hasn't seen any. All beds are rented.

Plant Clinic: The Plant Clinic is doing well. May is full. Everything looks good.

Fair Report: The Fair this year will be July 22-26. Sam isn't sure we will get entry tickets this year. We will still be located in the Oaks Pavilion with MFP and possibly beekeepers. The theme this year is Boots, Bulls and Bands.

Plant Sale Committee 2025: Tina will buy a pallet of potting soil in July for cuttings. Mary felt that the second Saturday in May was good timing for the plant sale. Herb sales were great. Lots of berries were sold. Tina thought all the plants were healthy. There was discussion about different venues for the plant sale as well as perhaps starting at 9 next year.

School Garden Grants: Three school garden grants were awarded. There were 4 applications but one wasn't granted because it wasn't located on school grounds. Of the grants awarded there was Myrtle Crest which received \$186.10 to establish an herb and salad garden for the cafeteria. Hillcrest received \$451.62 and Winter Lakes HS \$793 for 5 planter boxes.

Coos Bay Farmers Market: We were located on the main drag but this may change.

Bandon Farmers Market: Started Friday. We will be located outside next to produce growers. Jessica Pancoast, who lives in Bandon, has the FM supplies and is scheduled to work all the morning shifts so she will bring and set up. She will come back at 3 to pick up and store for next month. This will relieve Sam of having to go to Bandon if she doesn't have another reason to go.

Oregon Master Gardeners Association-Mary Dixon: The OMGA newsletter was just released. Sam will forward to the MGs. Joy of Gardening information is in the current issue. Please read who will be there. The dates are July 11 and 12. Dorm rooms are \$40 a night for Thursday and Friday. Donations are being asked for the silent auction.
