




Our plant-clinic office at the college has new technology! Please read the announcement below for updated procedures.



You will only need to log into the computer upon your arrival. It is now set to stay awake for the duration of your plant clinic session (3 hours from the first time you log-in). This means no more repeated log-ins every time it goes to sleep! When you leave your plant clinic session, you don't need to shut anything down on the computer. Just turn out the room light and close the door. The computer knows what to do!

On the computer desktop there are two notes on the screen with information about what you need to know during your time there. If there is anything additional that you think would be helpful to add, please let me know and I'll get that taken care of.

Review & Reflection on the Greenhouse Plant Project

From Marilyn:

This was my first full season of working in the greenhouse as the Project Leader, and I had a good mentor in Peggy Peterson. Thank you, Peggy. I learned so much this year. We had 8 weeks to plant and grow several thousand plants for the Spring sale on May 7, instead of the normal 14 weeks. We cut back on the variety of plants we grew, concentrating on tomatoes and vegetables for the Master Gardeners and on annuals for the NORCOR sales.

One benefit of the shorter work season was the plants weren't in the greenhouse for the extra 6 weeks, and they were healthy,. The weather was cool, which was a drawback for producing flowers, but the plants didn't suffer from disease or pests that sometimes infect greenhouse plants. We will make a decision this fall as to how many weeks we will grow for the 2023 sale.

One positive change was having a short daily meeting before starting each work day. Sometimes we demonstrated how to plant seeds, or trim plants, or tie up tomatoes, other days we just touched base about what we wanted to accomplish that day. Every person knew what the goal was for that day, and felt comfortable in knowing they had an important job to do.

There was some confusion on who was eligible to work in the greenhouse. I didn't make it clear that ALL were welcome, and some people who would have liked to work in the greenhouse felt that they weren't welcome. I sincerely apologize for this.

One change we are in discussion on, is to hold a pre-sale. We will research how this might work, and will advertise this before the 2023 Spring Sale, This should improve our sales which were down this year from previous years.


From Candy:

This was my first year back in Master Gardeners after more than ten years. It was great to see that we still have the NORCOR project going, although there have been a number of changes over the years. For the most part I saw adaptations that had been made to deal with changes in personnel at NORCOR, changes in teachers for the Juvenile side, changes in leadership in Master Gardeners, and the impacts of COVID on all systems. Many of these changes have improved the working partnership, but I think it will be important to sit down in early fall with all of the involved parties and review what is working and what could be improved as we look to next year.

My experience this year as a volunteer at NORCOR was good. I really liked the short meeting before starting work each day. I also appreciated the willingness to adapt work assignments so that we could be more efficient and still give opportunities for every volunteer to learn/practice the various aspects of working in the greenhouse.

Most importantly I want to thank our Project Leader Marilyn Richardson and her mentor Peggy Peterson. Both are extremely competent and helpful. Both put in a tremendous number of volunteer hours so that projects like that at NORCOR can be successful.





Chocolate Chip Cherry Bars

Not sure what to make with cherries? These cherry bars use a blondie base and turn out perfectly every single time! These bars are seriously so good!!

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, melted (1 stick)
- cup light brown sugar, packed
- 1 large egg
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt, optional
- 3/4-1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
- cup cherries (fresh or frozen)

- 1. Preheat oven to 350F. Line an 8-by-8-inch pan with aluminum foil, spray with cooking spray; set aside.
- 2. In a medium microwave-safe bowl, melt the butter, about 60 seconds.
- 3. To the melted butter, add the brown sugar and stir to combine.
- 4. Add the egg, vanilla, and stir to combine. Add the flour, salt, and stir until just combined, taking care not to over mix or the blondies will be tough.
- 5. Fold in chocolate chips, fruit (I don't halve the cherries: I like them chunky and big), and pour batter into prepared pan, smoothing it lightly with a spatula or offset knife if necessary.
- 6. Bake for 27 to 32 minutes, or until edges begin to slightly pull away from sides of pan and center is set.
- 7. Allow bars to cool for at least 1 hour before slicing and serving. Blondies can be stored in an airtight container at room temperature or in the refrigerator for up to 1 week or frozen for up to 3 months.
