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Why Are They The Deadliest?

Catching 1 prey every 50 minutes, the black-footed cat has a 60% success rate in hunting, making it the deadliest of all cats. Its favorite meals are rodents. Larger prey? No problem!



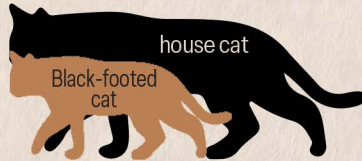
Nicknamed "Ant-hill Tiger"

At just 4 lbs on average, their small size and fierce attitude earned them their nickname.



Where do they live?

They live in the dry grasslands of southern Africa.
