
Polar Bears: Majestic

Did You Know?

- Polar bears are excellent swimmers, capable of covering long distances of around 60 miles without rest in the frigid waters of the Arctic Ocean.
- Under their white fur, polar bears have black skin that helps keep them warm by absorbing the heat from the sun.
- These magnificent creatures primarily hunt seals, using their keen sense of smell to detect prey up to a mile away.



Adaptations for Survival

- Insulation: Their white fur and thick blubber keep them warm in temperatures as low as negative 50°F.
- Powerful Paws: Polar bears have large, webbed paws that help them swim and walk on ice without sinking.
- **Stealthy Hunters**: Polar bears rely on patience and stealth, waiting near breathing holes to catch seals as they surface for air.

Conservation Status: Vulnerable

Polar bears are threatened by the effects of climate change. As the Arctic warms, sea ice melts, making it harder for them to hunt and find food. This is why it's critical to reduce carbon emissions and protect their fragile habitat.
