Starting class each week

You should have received a confirmation email from Zoom after you registered for the class initially. You received a unique registration link. I will have Zoom resend your confirmation information shortly. You should save that email and follow the link to join the rest of our classes, AND/OR you can save it to an electronic calendar if you use one (Outlook, Google Calendar, etc) for reminders. Please come to class early. We did have some difficulties getting some people "thru the door" in Zoom last time, which slowed down the start of the first class. We plan to start and end classes on time going forward, as we do in the classroom. Late arrivals are disruptive (in Zoom as in a classroom), and may have to sit in the waiting room until an appropriate time for them to join.

We will have a little slide show running, and will greet people as they join. This will let you tell if your system is up and running, and maybe learn something new while you wait.

Prep for Class 2

The theme for Classes 2 and 3 is **What's going on in your woods**. On Thursday we'll tackle the topics of how a forest grows, develops, and stays healthy. Here, as promised, is your "class prep" for self-study recommendations ahead of your next class.

- Optional, for those of you in and around the valley curious about the impacts of our drought, read the short blog posts from June 2018 <u>Another rough year for Willamette</u> <u>Valley trees Part 1</u> and <u>Another rough year for Willamette Valley trees Part 2</u> which are just 2 in a long series.
